The natural microscopic pores in the dirt are likely heavily restricted by decades of biological buildup. An older field simply cannot process water at the same speed as a fresh installation, making it highly susceptible to sudden flooding and backward pressure.

Protecting this fragile infrastructure requires a drastic increase in the frequency of professional maintenance. You cannot wait the standard three to five years to empty a cinder block tank. Inside the home, managing the daily hydraulic load is critical to preserving the older drainage field. The families who built these homes did not own high-capacity washing machines or power showers. You must actively reduce the amount of water you push into the system to match the historical design capacity. Spread laundry over the entire week, install aggressive flow restrictors on all taps, and never empty large volumes of water, such as a hot tub, directly into the household drains. Giving the aging soil plenty of time to rest between water cycles prevents the field from becoming permanently waterlogged and failing completely.
